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## Introduction

## Background

Since 2007, Arts Council of Wales has conducted an annual attendance and participation survey among children and young people. Information on attendance to arts events and participation in artistic activities is collected via a series of questions asked on the Beaufort Research Children's Omnibus Survey each year. A copy of the questionnaire used to collect the information is provided in Appendix 3 of this report.

A full introduction to the Children's omnibus can be found in the main report titled 'Children’s Omnibus 2019: General Attendance and Participation in the Arts once a year or more'.

This report details levels of participation per demographic characteristic and region for each artform.

## Methodology

Data presentation
The data are presented in a series of line and bar charts, which show the percentage of children and young people who have taken part in each of the activities asked about in the survey. The results are split out by key demographic grouping and region. Where frequency of participation is presented, it refers to a rate of once a year or more often. Definitions of regions and social grades can be found in Appendices 1 and 2 of this report.

Some figures do not add up to $100 \%$ as the sample for them is children and young people who could have taken part in more than one artform in more than one way.

## Participation per Artform

Respondents were asked to indicate how often they took part in each of the following activities:

- Musical activities
- Drama or theatrical activity
- Dance activity
- Film and video making or photography
- Visual arts and crafts
- Digital Arts
- Creative Writing

It should be noted that up until 2009, the survey asked about 'media arts' as opposed to 'digital arts,' which was introduced in 2010. Whilst broadly examining a similar type of activity, media arts was defined as website design and working with your PC, whereas digital arts are more clearly defined as follows: creating and making arts using digital technology e.g. uploading, creating or remixing arts-related content (e.g., on YouTube, Flickr).

## Participation in Musical Activities



Under half of children and young people take part in Musical Activities at least once a year since 2018, increasing by less than half a percentage point to $46 \%$ in 2019.

Figure 1. Percentage of children and young people taking part in musical activities once a year or more often.

How and When Musical Activities are participated in
Children and young people mostly take part in Musical Activities during school time (62.4\%), and 32.6\% take part during their own time. A minority of $4.1 \%$ take part at schools' initiative but outside of school time.


[^1]Participation in Musical Activities by Social Grade


Figure 3. Percentage of children and young people taking part in musical activities once a year or more often by social grade.

Children and young people from ABC1 homes are most likely to take part in musical activities at 46.5\%. Attendance amongst children from C2DE households is 7.2 percentage points lower, at 42.3\% (below average levels).

## Participation in Musical Activities by Gender

Girls are most likely to participate in musical activities, with 49.2\% taking part at least once in 2019 - the same levels as 2018. Boys' participation levels are also stable at 42.9\%, under average levels.


Figure 4. Percentage of children and young people taking part in musical activities once a year or more often by gender.

## Participation in Musical Activities by Age



Participation in Musical Activities is highest amongst 7- to 10-yearolds at $67.8 \%$, followed by 11 - to 15 -year-olds at $45.1 \%$. About a quarter of 16-18-year-olds took part at least once in 2019. These levels have remained stable since 2018.

## Participation in Musical Activities by Arts Council of Wales Region

As in 2018, the South West region has the strongest Musical Activities participation levels in 2019, with $49.1 \%$ of the young population taking part at least once that year. It is followed by South Central Wales at 47.9\%. The South East and North regions still have below average levels, at 43.9\% and 40.9\% respectively.

Participation in Musical Activities by Welsh speaking ability


Figure 7. Percentage of children and young people taking part in musical activities once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

Welsh speakers remain more likely to take part in Musical Activities at least once a year than non-speakers, at $51.6 \%$ vs. $42.6 \%$ respectively. The difference between them has decreased from 12.2 percentage points in 2018 to 9 percentage points in 2019.

## Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities



Figure 8. Percentage of children and young people taking part in drama or theatrical activities once a year or more often.

Participation in Drama or Theatrical activities has remained stable since 2017, with $35 \%$ of children and young people taking part in 2019.

## How and When Drama or Theatrical Activities are Participated in

The majority of children and young people take part in theatrical activities during school time, at $78.7 \%$. A sixth of them take part in their own time, and a minority of 5.1\% participate at schools' initiative but outside of school time.

Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities by Social Grade


Figure 10. Percentage of children and young people taking part in drama or theatrical activities once a year or more often by social grade.

Children and young people from ABC1 backgrounds have seen a decrease in participation in drama/theatre by 3.9 percentage point to $39.4 \%$, however they are still more likely to take part than children from C2DE homes by 9.1 percentage points.

## Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities by Gender

Girls are more likely to participate in drama or theatre than boys, at $37.4 \%$ and $32.7 \%$ respectively. The difference between them has decreased from 7.4 percentage points in 2018 to 4.7 percentage points in 2019, as boys' participation has remained stable but girls' participation has decreased by 2.2 percentage points.

Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities by Age


Figure 12. Percentage of children and young people taking part in drama or theatrical activities once a year or more often by age.

7- to 10-year-olds remain most likely to take part in drama or theatre at $45.2 \%$, however these levels have decreased whilst 11-15-year-olds' and 16-18-year-olds participation have increased to $44.5 \%$ and $16.6 \%$ respectively.

## Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities by

 Arts Council of Wales RegionThe South Central region continues to show the highest level of participation in drama or theatre, with $38.2 \%$ of children and young people having taken part at least once in 2019. It is followed by the South West and South East at respectively $35.9 \%$ and $35.7 \%$. The North has seen the largest fall in participation, by 3.8 percentage points to $28.9 \%$.


[^2]Participation in Drama or Theatrical Activities by Welsh speaking ability

Welsh speakers are more likely to take part in drama/theatre at 44\%, whilst non-speakers' participation has decreased to 29.5\% - still below average participation levels.

## Participation in Dance



Participation to dance continues to slowly decrease, albeit by less than 1 percentage point between 2018 and 2019: a fifth of children and young people took part at least once in 2019 (20.3\%).

## How and When Dance is Participated in

Children and young people mostly take part in dance activities during school time (45.6\%) or in their own time ( $42.5 \%$ ), with $10.3 \%$ taking part at schools' initiative but outside of school time.


[^3]Participation in Dance by Social Grade


Participation to Dance is higher amongst children from ABC1 households (21.5\%). It has however decreased by 1.5 percentage point since 2018, narrowing down the gap in participation between them and those from C2DE homes to 2.4 percentage points.

## Participation in Dance by Gender

Girls are over twice as likely to take part in Dance activities as boys are, with $28 \%$ participation for girls and $12.9 \%$ participation for boys. Participation has increased by 3.1 percentage points among boys however, whilst it had diminished by 4.6 percentage points for girls.

## Participation in Dance by Age



Similarly to previous years, the younger, the most likely to take part in Dance at least once a year: 32.6\% of 7-10-year-olds participated once or more in 2019, 24.4\% of 1115 -year-olds and $15 \%$ of 16 -18-year-olds. 7 - to 10 -yearolds are the only age group to have seen a decrease in participation however, by 4.3 percentage point. The highest increase was among 16 to 18 -year olds, whose participation nearly doubled since 2018.

## Participation in Dance by Arts Council of Wales

 RegionParticipation in Dance is highest in the South Central region at $22.3 \%$, followed by the South East at $20.9 \%$, the North at $19.2 \%$ and finally the South West at $18.9 \%$. This is a decrease for both South East and South West Wales, by 2 percentage points and 1.4 percentage points respectively.


[^4]Participation in Dance by Welsh speaking ability

Figure 21. Percentage of children and young people taking part in dance once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

Participation in Dance is highest amongst Welsh speakers, at 27.5\%, a 2.7 percentage point increase from 2018. It has decreased by 1.5 percentage point among non-speakers however, to $16 \%$ - increasing the gap between speakers and non-speaker from 6.3 percentage points in 2018 to 11.5 percentage points in 2019.

## Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography



Figure 22. Percentage of children and young people taking part in film and video making or photography once a year or more often.

There has been 1.5 percentage point increase in participation in Film, Video \& Photography, with 37.4\% of children and young people taking part at least once a year in 2019, almost reaching 2017 levels again.

## How and When in Film \& Video Making or

 Photography are Participated inChildren and young people mostly participate in Film/Video Making/Photography in their own time (not organised by school) at $54.5 \%$. This is a 11.2 percentage points reduction from 2018. Attendances organised by school during school time have increased by 12.5 percentage points to $40.9 \% .4 \%$ of participation is organised by school but outside of school time.

## Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography by Social Grade



Participation in Film/Video Making/Photography is higher among children and young people from ABC1 households (41.9\%) than those from C2DE homes (32.9\%).

## Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography

 by GenderAfter a decrease in attendance between 2017 and 2018, participation levels for both girls and boys has increased back up in 2019 - with boys remaining more likely to take part. Girls attendance increased by 2.9 percentage point to $37 \%$ still below 2017 levels. $37.8 \%$ of boys took part at least once, a 1.8 percentage point increase.

It is the only artform aside from digital arts which boys are consistently more likely to participate in than girls.

Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography by Age


The younger the most likely to participate in Film, Video Making or Photography: 37.4\% of children and younger people took part at least once in 2019, 37.1\% of 11-15-year-olds and $25.6 \%$ of $16-18$-year-olds.

Whilst 11-15-year-olds' participation has increased and 7-10-year-olds' has remained stable, 16-18-year-olds have seen a fall in participation by 7.8 percentage points.

Figure 26. Percentage of children and young people taking part in film and video making or photography once a year or more often by age.

## Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography by Arts Council of Wales Region

Participation in Film/Video/Photography is highest in the North in 2019, with $41.8 \%$ taking part at least once. It is followed by the South West (37.5\%), South Central (36.3\%) then the South East (33.7\%).

The North and South Central have seen an increase in attendance while the South East and South West have had a reduction in attendance.


[^6]Participation in Film \& Video Making or Photography by Welsh speaking ability


Figure 28. Percentage of children and young people taking part in film and video making or photography once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

Welsh speakers are more likely to take part in Film, Video Making or Photography: 43.2\% participated at least once in 2019. 9.2 percentage points below, $34 \%$ of non-Welsh speakers participated once or more 3.4 percentage points below average levels.

## Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts



Figure 29. Percentage of children and young people taking part in visual arts and crafts once a year or more often.

Visual Arts \& Crafts participation has seen the biggest decrease ( 5.6 percentage points) in participation in the last three years, and amongst all artforms this year, with 59.1\% of children and young people taking part at least once in 2019. It is no longer the most participated in artform.

## How and When Visual Arts \& Crafts are Participated in

Most children and young people take part in visual arts and crafts during school time at $66.6 \%$. $29.8 \%$ participate in their own time, and $3.2 \%$ take part at schools' initiative but outside of school time.

Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts by Social Grade


Figure 31. Percentage of children and young people taking part in visuals arts and crafts once a year or more often by social grade.

Participation in Visual Arts and Crafts by Social Grade has fluctuated over the years: whilst in 2018 it was higher amongst children and young people from C2DE backgrounds, in 2019 it was higher among those from ABC1 households (61.1\%). This is a decrease in participation levels for both groups, however the sharpest decrease is amongst the C2DE group, whose participation dropped by 7.1 percentage points to $56.9 \%$.

## Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts by Gender

Girls remain more likely to take part in visual arts/crafts, at 63.5\% 8.7 percentage points above boys' participation at $54.8 \%$. This is a decrease in participation since 2018 for both, by 5.5 percentage points for boys and 5.8 percentage points for girls. Boys' participation to visual arts and crafts is now under average levels.


[^8]Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts by Age


The older, the least likely to take part in visual arts and crafts at least once a year: $81.6 \%$ of 7 to 10-year-olds took part at least once in 2019, 66.1\% of 11- to 15 -year-olds, and $25.7 \%$ of 16 - to 18 -year-olds. These are lower participation levels than 2018 for all age groups, the strongest decrease being amongst 16-18-year-olds, at 6.9 percentage points.

## Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts by Arts Council

 of Wales RegionParticipation in the Visual Arts and Crafts is highest in the North in 2019, with $63.6 \%$ of children and young people here taking part once or more. This is followed by the South West at $60.4 \%$, the South Central at $58.8 \%$ and the South East at $51.7 \%$. All four regions have had a decrease in participation to visual arts/crafts, with the largest taking place in the South East at 6.1 percentage points. Two regions are now seeing below average participation: South East and South Central Wales.

Participation in Visual Arts \& Crafts by Welsh speaking ability


Figure 35. Percentage of children and young people taking part in visuals arts and crafts once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

Welsh speakers' participation has slightly increased by 1.8 percentage points to $69.1 \%$, and non-speakers' participation has fallen by 10.1 percentage points to $53 \%$. Welsh speakers thus remain more likely to take part in visual arts/crafts than nonspeakers, however the difference between them has increased from 4.2 percentage points in 2018 to 16.1 percentage points in 2019.

## Participation in Digital Arts



Participation in Digital Arts has at a similar level as 2018, at 41.9\%, after a sharp decrease between 2017 and 2018.

How and When Digital Arts are Participated in
Half of children and young people take part in Digital Arts during school time (50.1\%), and 45.1\% participate in their own time outside of school. Participation at schools' initiative but outside of school time was nearly halved, to 3.8\%.


Figure 37. Percentage of children and young people taking part in digital arts once a year or more often by setting.

Participation in Digital Arts by Social Grade

At 43.6\% of participation, children from ABC1 households are the most likely to take part in Digital Arts. Participation from children from C2DE backgrounds is 3.5 percentage points lower, at 40.1\%.

## Participation in Digital Arts by Gender

Boys are more likely to take part in Digital Arts than girls by 4.8 percentage points, at 44.3\% - an increase from 2018. Girls’ participation has decreased, to $39.5 \%$.
It is the only artform aside from Film/Video/Photography which boys are consistently more likely to participate in than girls.


Figure 39. Percentage of children and young people taking part in digital arts once a year or more often by gender.

Participation in Digital Arts by Age


Over half of 11 to 15-year-olds took part in Digital Arts at least once in 2018 (54.8\%) - the strongest participation levels of all age groups. They are followed by $7-10$-year-olds at $38 \%$ participation. Just over a quarter of 16-18-year-olds participated at least once, at 26.9\%.

## Participation in Digital Arts by Arts Council of Wales Region

The strongest participation in Digital Arts in 2019 comes from the North, with $46.2 \%$ of children and young people having taken part at least once. Following closely is South Central, at 45.2\%. This is an increase for both.

Both the South East and the South West have seen a decrease in participation, at $39.6 \%$ and $37.2 \%$ respectively.

## Participation in Digital Arts by Welsh speaking ability



Figure 42. Percentage of children and young people taking part in digital arts once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

The difference between Welsh-speaker and non-Welsh speakers continues to increase (from 7 percentage points in 2018 to 11.3 percentage points in 2019), as participation grows among Welsh speakers to $49 \%$ and decreases to $37.7 \%$ among non-speakers.

## Participation in Creative Writing



Creative Writing participation has decreased by 2.3 percentage points to $60.8 \%$ this year, however it is now the artform with the highest participation.

How and When Creative Writing is Participated in
The vast majority of children young people participate in creative writing during school time at $83.5 \%$, with $16.5 \%$ taking part in their own time and a minority of 2.9\% participating at schools' initiative but outside of school time.

## Participation in Creative Writing by Social Grade



Figure 45. Percentage of children and young people taking part in creative writing once a year or more often by social grade.

Children and young people from ABC1 backgrounds are more likely to take part in creative writing at least once a year (64.9\%) than those from C2DE backgrounds (56.5\%). This constitutes a decrease in participation for both groups, by 2.2 percentage points for the $A B C 1$ group and by 3.4 percentage points for the C2DE group.

## Participation in Creative Writing by Gender

Girls are more likely to take part than boys in creative writing by 10.5 percentage points, at $66.2 \%$, although over half of boys ( $55.7 \%$ ) took part at least once a year in 2019. This is a decrease in participation for both, the strongest being among girls at 3.1 percentage points.

## Participation in Creative Writing by Age



Participation in creative writing is lower as children are older. It was highest among 7-10-year-olds at $81.7 \%$, followed by $11-15$-year-olds at $64.3 \%$. Finally, a quarter of 16 -18-yearolds took part at least once in 2019. This is a decrease for all groups, the biggest being found amongst 11-15-year-olds with a 6.1 percentage points fall in participation levels.

## Participation in Creative Writing by Arts Council of Wales Region

In 2019, participation in creative writing is highest in the South Central region at 65.7\%, the only Welsh region which saw an increase in participation level that year. Participation in the North has dropped by 5.7 percentage points to $60.7 \%$, and in the South West by 5.2 percentage points to $59 \%$. Participation in the South East was similar to 2018 levels, at 56.5\%.

Figure 49. Percentage of children and young people taking part in creative writing once a year or more often by Welsh speaking ability.

Welsh-speaking children and young people remain more likely to take part in creative writing than non-speakers, with $68.8 \%$ taking part in least once in 2019, whilst $56 \%$ of nonspeakers participated at least once. This is a decrease for both groups, by 1.9 percentage points for Welsh speakers and by 2.5 for non-speakers.

## Appendix 1: Social Grades Definitions

The population can be divided into six socio-economic groups or social grades, which are based on the occupation of the Chief Income Earner in the household. Everyone in the household has the same social grade as the Chief Income Earner. To aid analysis, the first three grades and the last three grades are often grouped together into ABC1s and C2DEs which are seen as equating to the 'Middle Classes' and the 'Working Classes':

A "Upper Middle Class" - Higher managerial, administrative, professional e.g. Chief Executive, Company Director, Senior Civil Servant, Doctor, Judge, Barrister, Executive Accountant

B "Middle Class" - Senior and intermediate managerial, administrative, professional e.g. Secondary School Teacher, Librarian, Computer Programmer, Probation Officer, Social Worker
C1 "Lower Middle Class" - Supervisory, clerical, junior managerial e.g. Clerical/Office Workers, Shop Floor Supervisor, Bank Clerk, Salesperson, Student

C2 "Skilled Working Class" - Skilled manual workers e.g. Electrician, Carpenter, Fire Fighter, Foreman
D "Working Class" - Semi-skilled and unskilled manual workers e.g. Shop Worker, Assembly Line Worker, Refuse Collector, Messenger, Bar Staff
E Those wholly reliant on state benefits including the long-term unemployed and pensioners without private pensions. Casual labourers.

professional, qualified, and non-manual occupations

## C2DEs -

skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled manual workers and nonworking people
