We will write reports every 6 months to tell you how we are doing with our plan. This is the first one.

BAME means a black person, an Asian person or a minority ethnic person.

A **minority ethnic person** is someone who lives in a place where most of the other people are a different race.



But we still have a lot of work to do. Not many disabled people do paid work in the arts. Not enough BAME people work in the arts in Cardiff.



We must have more disabled people and BAME people in top jobs.



This report tells you how we are doing with our **equality objectives**.

Our **equality objectives** are important things we must do to make the arts fairer for everyone.



Make sure people within the arts sector know about equality



We have talked with a lot of people about equality and will keep talking.



At our last conference one of the main subjects was equality and diversity. We looked at the best way to involve everyone.



Diversity is valuing different people who have different ways of living and culture.



We paid for 2 films about:



- the arts that older people and young people are getting involved in
- working with the arts in communities with people who have a hard life.



After the conference we put these films on Facebook and YouTube.



We ran some training on using the Welsh language. We helped organisations to check how much they use Welsh now. And how they can use it more.



We will keep our **Equal Spaces** document up to date. We will make sure arts people know about it. And know about our **Equality Guide**. They both give information about equality in the arts.



We paid for an instruction booklet to help places include people whose hearing is not good. You can get it on our website.



We are working on a new website. We want it to be as **accessible** as possible.



Accessible means everyone is able to use it.



Have different types of people working in the arts

We now advertise our jobs in:



Stonewall Cymru for lesbian, gay and bisexual people



lesbian women are women who are attracted to other women



gay men are men who are attracted to other men



bisexual men and women are people who are attracted to both men and women.



the Race Council Cymru for BAME people



- the **Chinese in Wales** association.



We ask people applying for a job if they see themselves as disabled.



We found out that there are different ways to say if you are disabled or not.



Some people may not see themselves as disabled but the Equality law says they are. Now we will ask if the Equality law sees them as disabled.



We will have equality and diversity training for our staff this year. We are trying to find the best people to do the training for us.



BBC Wales and **S4C** are also trying to have more diverse staff. We have joined a group with them to find the best way to do this.

Creative steps programme



Our creative steps programme supports disability and BAME arts organisations. We helped:



- Taking Flight Theatre Company to learn how to make sure people know about them. Also how to find businesses to support them.



 Fio. They use the arts to work with BAME young people and those who have a difficult life. We helped them understand what to do to get a big grant.



 Age Cymru to carry on using the arts to work with older people.

Unlimited Programme



The **Unlimited Programme** supports disabled artists and arts organisations in the UK.



This programme gave money for 2 plays to be put on in Wales. 5 people also got money to go on training.



Groups who ask us for a grant must now show us their equality plan. We said no plan no money.



All groups now have equality plans. We help them to check how good they are and see how they could do better.



We will keep doing this and give them training on equality.



We will look at how we make decisions on Lottery funding.



Our **equality guide** and **equal spaces** give a lot of information about doing good work on equality. We will pay for more things to help the arts with equality.

Make sure all types of people are represented in leadership roles



All organisations who ask us for a grant must now show us their equality plan. We expect the plan to say how they will get more diversity on their management groups.



We will work with the groups on this. We will have training for them.



We will make sure everyone knows about our equality guide and equal spaces.

Get different types of people enjoying art



Hynt is our disability access card. It makes it easier for people who need some support to go to arts events.



9,500 people have a **hynt** card. People with a hynt card are buying more and more tickets every year. We will keep checking how well the **hynt** card is doing.



We give money to help arts projects to travel around Wales. They must use accessible places for this. We will check how well this is going.



We have money to give to help places be more accessible. Not many places asked for this money. We will find out why.



Every year arts companies from the UK go to a special event in Italy. This year **Shape Arts** looked at how accessible their venue was.



They were in a very old and beautiful place. It was easy for people in wheelchairs to use the place. But there are other things they can do to make it more accessible. We will hear what is being done later.

Get different types of people taking part in arts



We have 2 projects that work with people of different ages:



 Working with older people living in residential homes who usually are not involved with the arts. This is with cARTrefu Cymru and Age Cymru.



 Creative learning through the arts works with schools. The schools are in places where people are poor. Or have other problems that may get in the way of learning for the children.



Nearly half the special schools in Wales get money for creative learning. We aim to work with all of the special schools in Wales.



We found out what work is already going on with the arts and health.



We found 207 arts projects. Nearly half of them focus on the age of people – older people and young people. Then comes work with disabled people.



This means nearly half of the projects do work with all other people in the **protected groups**.



Protected groups are groups of people the law protects from being treated unfairly because of who they are. For example a person who is treated unfairly because they are young.



With this information we are writing a plan for the arts and health in Wales.



We are looking at a project with the Gypsy, Roma and Travelling community in Wales.



We are working with other groups to bring people together from all the arts.



We are looking at the best ways to work with older people for them to be healthy and happy.
